

Dear Friends,

"A new year beckons, with all its promise of new leaves to turn over, our dreams of what we may try to do and accomplish, our hopes for what may be. There will be joys, successes, satisfactions, growth and change of many kinds. Of course, the new year may also hold fears for us, about challenges we are not sure we know how to meet, worries about what we must try to do and accomplish, apprehensions for what may be. There may be sadnesses and struggles ahead too."

Well that's what I wrote for the January Newsletter in 2007, a couple of weeks after Rachel and I moved to Brancepeth. It seemed a good place to start in writing my last letter here. It feels pretty apt for us: looking forward, as we prepare to move to Darlington in late January, we have mixed feelings: sadness at leaving; some trepidation about the challenges my new post, and living in a new place; some excitement about new opportunities.

Looking back, though, Rachel and I obviously needn't have worried about 2007, nor the ten years that followed it! We've loved living here, and are very grateful to the overlapping communities of village and church for making us so welcome. Thank you for having us.

In the village, we've tried to join in, have fun, and generally encourage partying where possible (especially in fancy dress). We hope along the way that we have contributed to some of the many good things about Brancepeth: a genuine sense of community; a range of regular activities, enabling people to both pursue and enjoy interests but – through that – also get to know others; a real concern for the well-being of neighbours; and more. This is a good place to live, and you've been very good to us: thank you.

In the church, we've also tried to join in (!). There are also many good things about St Brandon's. We have experienced – and I have seen others experience it too – a real welcome, and supportive friendships. There is an ability here to celebrate the Christian faith in both tried and trusted traditional ways, and more innovative ones too: we can do both a solemn

Good Friday service, and a Messy Church gathering with kids (and leaders) dressed up as Super-heroes — and both have their place. The church members and PCC here hold a very good balance between maintaining an ancient building and remembering what it's for in the first place: this is great heritage, but it is not museum; rather, it's a place of living faith.

Looking forward, church members may feel the potential uncertainties of this new year rather acutely: what will the future hold? Who might be the next Priest-in-Charge? And in what sort of arrangement — will this be combined with a diocesan job (as it has been for me and recent predecessors) or organised some other way?

These are all unknowns right now. There'll be change of some kind, whatever happens, and change is – obviously – unsettling.

On the other hand, change can bring good things. It was, I know, devastating when the church was almost destroyed by fire nineteen years ago. But look at the astonishingly beautiful church building which was then lovingly created: still St Brandon's, but different. From my perspective, many of the things we have done well in church during my time here have been helped – and many have only been possible at all – because of this fabulous, flexible space, with its modern facilities. That's change for you, when it works.

I enjoy the books of Margaret Wheatley, who writes about organisations, management, change and all that. She makes the point that many organisations expend enormous energy trying to maintain stability and control. However, in the natural world the only things that don't change are dead: living things are always in flux, experiencing alteration, modification and growth. So, change is one of the vital signs of life. She argues that the same is true for people, businesses, families — churches too.

Our choice is not between change and no change, but only ever how we embrace and work with change, so that it becomes not loss but transformation. So this is my hope for this church, that I have come to love very much: that just as you have embraced and worked with change

so well in the last twenty years, and have seen life and growth through this, so it will be in the new year, and the new chapter of your story here.

A very dear friend of Rachel's – and mine too – died in early December. (Funnily enough, her parents used to ring the bells here in St Brandon's when they were students in Durham.) She left us a card, with an extract from the poem *God Knows* by Minnie Harkins. It was a wonderful thing to know this had been Theresa's prayer as she faced the most uncertain journey of all, and so this is my prayer for us all as 2018 arrives, with all our hopes, fears, and questions:

I said to the man who stood at the gate of the year:
"Give me a light that I may tread safely into the unknown."
And he replied:

"Go out into the darkness and put your hand into the hand of God.

That shall be to you better than light and safer than a known way."

So I went forth, and finding the hand of God, trod gladly into the night.

And He led me towards the hills and the breaking of day in the lone east.

Thank you so much, once again, for all you have given us;

As you know, I am moving on from my current role in clergy training and therefore also – sadly – from St. Brandon's. My installation as Archdeacon of Auckland will take place in a service on February 11th. I'm never sure about the idea of being "installed"; it does make one sound rather like a dishwasher. However, that really is what it's called ... so please do come to it anyway!

The service is taking place within Choral Evensong in the Cathedral on Sunday 11th February, at 3.30 pm. Anyone who would like to come is most welcome, and please do. (At this stage I'm not sure if I'm going to be able to organise refreshments afterwards – it's a little complicated, partly because some other people are being installed into Cathedral canonries at the same service. If this does prove possible, I'll let you know in due course. If not, my apologies in advance!)

The Cathedral will reserve a block of seats for all parishioners who'd like to be there; I just need to give them an accurate number in advance. So, if you do want to come, please either sign the list that I'll put in church from Sunday 31st December to Sunday 14th January, or send me an e-mail (ricksimpson300@btinternet.com) by the evening of Tuesday January 16th. (After that date, you could still just turn up on the day, as the Cathedral won't run out of seats; you might just be further back.)

Joan Carter

August 28th 1937 – November 19th 2017

Born in Fulwell in Sunderland just before the Second World War, Mum spent a great deal of her early childhood as an evacuee in Cliburn a village near Penrith in Cumbria with her mother and sister. It was during that time she developed a passion for the Lake District and would roam around the countryside enjoying the outdoors. On returning to Sunderland after the war she attended St Anthony's Girls School which she didn't enjoy and used to tell stories of misbehaving for the nuns. She left school with one Zoology O'level, which she was very proud of! Her lack of qualifications however didn't hold her back and she started working in the typing pool of an accountancy firm in Sunderland in the late fifties. There she met Alan, a trainee accountant from Durham and romance blossomed. They married in 1959 in St Aiden's Church in Roker and moved to a house there overlooking the sea. Mum always loved socialising and entertaining, and she and dad had many parties, days out and camping trips with friends in the early years of their marriage. In 1963 she gave up work to have my brother Richard and I followed in 1965.

In 1975 we moved to Brancepeth. Mum loved '7 The Village' and threw herself in to village life. She attended church regularly and joined the Community Association being treasurer for many years. Over the years she helped to organise numerous events in the village hall, Beetle Drives, Harvest Suppers, Christmas shows, she always invited the carol singers in on Christmas Eve, everyone gathered around our piano in the dining room, sherry glasses in hands, singing carols. Her and Dad always attended the legendary Brancepeth Progressive Suppers too, she rarely over indulged in alcohol, which was just as well as Dad on occasion did! An accomplished badminton player, she represented the village in local competitions many times. She also loved tennis, and on Saturday mornings you could often hear her shrieks and laughter emanating from the Abel's tennis court, in all temperatures!

She was devastated when Dad died in 1994 as they were absolutely devoted to each other, but Mum pulled herself round. By this time she had become a grandmother and I think all her grandchildren would agree that she was amazing and a positive, loving influence on them all. Kind, gentle, caring, calm and patient. Always having time to talk and explain the world to them, always encouraging them to explore their surroundings whether it be paddling, climbing trees, skimming stones, or sand castle building, and whistling, she was always whistling. She loved them dearly and was extremely proud of all five.

Her and her devoted dog Lottie could always be seen pottering around the village, walking, gardening, or clearing the cobbles at the front of the house. (She HATED that job!)

She lived in her much loved '7 The Village' as long a she possibly could after becoming ill in 2010, and that would not have been manageable without the help of her neighbours, in particular Brian and Alison Iley. Moving to Lambton House in 2013 and Richard and I bless the day we managed to secure her a room, as the care

there over the last four and a half years has been absolutely excellent. She was happy, comfortable and secure.

Mum died very peacefully in her sleep on a crisp November morning, with Richard and I by her side. I do hope everyone who knew Mum has as many happy memories as we have, she was one in a million. She will be greatly missed.
