Dear Friends,

There have been a number of notable deaths recently: Sir Roger Bannister, Sir Ken Dodd and, perhaps most notably of all, Professor Stephen Hawking. (Ecclesiastes says there's a time to die – but perhaps a good time is not just *before* an unusual but nonetheless major celebrity!).

Roger Bannister is, of course, best known as the first human to break the four-minute mile in 1954. He had competed in the 1952 Helsinki Olympics in the 1500-metres, coming a narrow fourth despite training only part-time because of his medical studies, and then set his sights on breaking the mile record. He always insisted, however, that his 40-year medical career was a greater achievement than the sub-four-minute mile. He was also a life-long churchgoer and his priest-daughter tells of reading prayers, psalms and hymns with him at his bedside shortly before he died.

Ken Dodd was also a committed churchgoer, regularly attending both Liverpool Cathedral and St John's Knotty Ash where he had sung as a choirboy. (Did you know, by the way, that the Liverpool football manager Jurgen Klopp has a daughter called Klippety?) The Bishop of Liverpool, the Rt Rev'd Paul Bayes said of him: "He brought joy and delight to millions, and although so many of us are in grief and sorrow here, I'm sure that there will now be a fresh gale of laughter in heaven". Perhaps our loss is heaven's gain!

Yet interestingly, of the three of them, it was Stephen Hawking, the atheist, who probably had the most influence on matters of faith. Rev'd Professor David Wilkinson, Principal of St John's College Durham and author of *God, Time and Stephen Hawking*, said that Stephen Hawking had given the world an "optimism that science can deal with all of its own questions about the universe", but more than that, "he reminded us of the weakness of any 'God of the gaps' view of God". If we need a God only to explain what science can't, then of course there will be less and less room for God as science discovers more and more.

In his book A Brief History of Time (one of the most purchased and least read books of all time ... how far did you get?), Stephen Hawking, in a

more agnostic phase, asked, "What is it that breathes fire into the equations and makes a universe for them to describe? ... Why does the universe go to all the bother of existing?" But in a later book, *The Grand Design*, written with an American physicist Leonard Mlodinow, they contended: "Spontaneous creation is the reason there is something rather than nothing, why the universe exists, why we exist. It is not necessary to invoke God to light the blue touchpaper and set the universe going". In response to this, Archbishop Rowan Williams wrote at the time that belief in God was "the belief that there is an intelligent living agent on whose activity everything depends for its existence. Physics on its own will not settle the question why there is something rather than nothing".

All of that, of course, tends to focus on the beginning of the universe and whether God was or wasn't involved. And while, in itself, that's an important issue, it leaves a lot else unsaid. As I write this (in Lent), we are in the process of focussing on another notable death, though by the time you read this, we may well have moved on from there to focus not on death but on life – new life, resurrection life, the Easter story.

At the heart of the Christian understanding of God is that, however it started, this isn't a world God has left to its own devices. Instead it's a world God has come to most particularly in Jesus, who, through his suffering and death, entered into all its dirt and pain and darkness including our own. And who, because of his resurrection from the dead, offers the prospect that the dirt, pain and darkness will not have the last word. And a God who offers the prospect that in time (well actually the other 'side' of it) there will be a new heaven and a new earth.

And quite possibly with Stephen Hawking there – who might well still be working out just how all *that* happened!

Annual Parochial Church Meeting St Brandon's Church Sunday 22nd April, 11.30 a.m. (roughly)

The church's Annual Meeting takes place on Sunday 22nd April, after the Parish Eucharist (at around 11.30 a.m.). Our hope in scheduling the meeting for this time is that many of those who have come for the service are then able to stay on for the Annual Meeting: please do.

The things we do in the meeting are important for the life and health of our church. It's the time when we elect the Church Wardens, the PCC and Deanery Synod reps; when we ask you to check that the accounts suggest we are running things properly; and when we review what the church has been doing.

Holding the meeting after the service means no extra journey out, just staying a little longer at church than we might do anyway. There's also a glass of wine available to help wash the reports down! If you see yourself as a member of St Brandon's, please come if you can.

If you wish to be able to vote in the meeting, you do need to be on the church's Electoral Roll (if you want to be elected to PCC, you also need to be on the Roll). This is not the same as the civil electoral roll, and if you have never signed a form to join the Roll, you won't be on it. Anyone who lives within the parish and/or has attended the church on a regular basis for at least six months is able to join the Roll – contact Carol Beeby to ask how to do this (carol21beeby@btinternet.com).

BRANCEPETH COMMUNITY SPEED WATCH

Brancepeth Community and the Neighbourhood Police Team (NPT) are working together to respond to complaints of speeding traffic on the A690 through Brancepeth Village and on Wolsingham Road.

A successful Pilot of Community Speed Watch (CSW) within Durham in 2013/2014 has now been rolled out which involves trained volunteers to experience first hand the scale of the issue and how reality matches their perceptions, as well as educating motorists to respect the posted speed limits.

Whilst CSW is an education tool for the Community, it includes an "Escalation" process if CSW identifies a significant speed problem over time. The NPT can then call upon the assistance from Special Operations Unit (SOU) for further intervention and longer-term solutions.

Volunteers from Brancepeth, trained by NPT, have been observing and recording traffic behavior since 25th October 2017 and forwarded details to our local NPT team who have then issued letters to speeding motorists. Overall we have found positive support from motorists for CSW and no significant adverse reactions.

CSW is seeking additional volunteers from the Brancepeth Community to continue this work. After training by NPT, volunteers would be required for a minimum of one CSW Session per month lasting no more than 2 hours including setting up time. If you would like further information or would like to observe the CSW at work, please contact Michael O'Connell on 07939 116550.

Any Budding Seafishers out there?

I've started doing a little boat seafishing for cod etc and wondered if there is anyone out there interested in setting up a small group which could make the occasional booking for a day out of Port of Tyne/Hartlepool or Sunderland. No real experience needed and most boats will hire out rods if you don't have one. It tends to cost around £30-40 per person per day, (or more if a small group decides to takes the boat to itself) but there's always the likelihood of at least the occasional fresh fish.
