The days are getting longer, snowdrops and aconites adorn the borders, chives show their tips, the countryside is greener by the day: spring is on its way! This is a wonderful season, when the light returns, and even if cold gales are still raging, we know better things are on their way. As a gardener, I will soon be nursing my first seedlings on the windowsill, enjoying their promise of delicious food. True, I do miss the frozen beauty of real winters; however, I do not miss dealing with frozen windscreens and icy roads on dark mornings, and again my lettuces survived the mild winter.

Looking at nature always provides a healthy framework for thought: Despite the doom and gloom of the daily news, which can give the feeling things are getting worse and worse, there is constancy and purpose in nature: Regardless of the mess caused by humans, the planet is revolving and the seasons are moving on. After dark nights, bright mornings will fill the mind with expectation and hope. Marvelling at a glorious dawn, we feel in our hearts that there is more than just *our* horizon.

What is it? I call it the innate knowledge that there is something bigger at work; as a Christian, I know it is God: '*By the word of the Lord the heavens were made, and all their host by the breath of his mouth.*'(Ps 33:6) The deep feeling of awe and peace that nature provides, calls for words like this: '*The LORD is my shepherd, I shall not want. He makes me lie down in green pastures; he leads me beside still waters; he restores my soul.*' (Ps 23:1-3) The words of the Psalms ring true down the ages, and one of their amazing features is the fact that they work equally well in all languages – unusual for poetry. I am enjoying them as much in English as in my mother tongue German, and I am pleasantly surprised that we read one in almost every service at St. Brandon's, thus joining a chorus of prayer that has been going on for millennia across many cultures. Looking unflinchingly at the full range of human emotions, they are able to hold together the great paradoxes of life: How can suffering and joy be so close together? '*I look up to the mountains - does my help come from there? My help comes from the LORD, who made heaven and earth!*' (Ps 121:1-2)

Just like a walk in God's glorious nature, the psalms refresh and restore the weary soul. Rejoice in spring with the psalms!

This is a public service, so everyone is very welcome to attend, to support the choir and to join in the singing of the hymns with gusto. It is a wonderful opportunity for St Brandon's and we do hope that plenty of people will come along to swell the congregation. The BBC normally requests that everyone is seated at least 15 minutes before the beginning of the service.

Jean Merrington (JM) interviewed by Sabine Heslop (SH)

SH: How long have you been living in Brancepeth? How did the choir start?

JM: Forty five years. The choir developed from a madrigal-group in our house. One Christmas, the then vicar the Reverend Alan Chesters asked us to sing at the carol service. Everybody liked it so much that it became an annual tradition for the madrigal-group. Over the years, the choir has grown and developed to be a village choir that rehearses in the Village Hall. Our focus these days is church music, since it is so beautiful! So this is a village choir that sings in church.

SH: Currently, you are preparing for a Taizé service. I know that Taizé is a village in Burgundy, where an ecumenical Christian monastic fraternity lives and works. What made you go there?

JM: Well, we were on a holiday in France and we thought it would be an interesting place to go. And it was!

SH: What makes Taizé special?

JM: The place has a buzz to it: It is full of young people from all over the world, who come there for discussion and prayer. Most stay in very basic accommodation such as tents. There is a very strong feeling of community. The main event is the Evening Prayer, where hundreds of people come together in candlelight, and what impresses me most is the silence in the service: So many people, and you could hear a pin drop!

SH: How does this combination of music and silence work?

JM: The chants are short lines, mostly taken from Scripture, and repeated again and again. They seem to permeate your being, so this meditative singing becomes a way of connecting with our inner life. Music touches places spoken words cannot reach! The silence enables you to listen attentively to God, and it gives your mind peace.

SH: True! Nothing can replace the beauty of human voices united in song, and thanks to your work, and all the talent in the choir, the result is utterly beautiful and moving! What are your plans for the future?

JM: We will be travelling to Taizé again this summer! For the choir, I hope we will keep it going a long time: We have a cupboard full of really good choral music!

This is the first of a series of interviews Sabine would like to conduct with people living in the village who offer time and talents in a variety of ways to enhance our community. It's good to know how other people help the village to thrive behind the scenes! If you would welcome a short time of Christian worship with friends and neighbours, we would love to see you.



FROM THE ARCHIVES......

1939 From the Minutes of the Trustees of the Village Hall

"Under the emergency conditions caused by the war there was no alternative but to accept the position caused by the Military Authorities billeting **W.A.T.S.** on the Village Hall from 11th September. According to the Billeting Summons it appeared that about 8d a night per person would be paid".

The *Auxiliary Territorial Service* (ATS; often pronounced as an acronym) was the *women's* branch of the British Army during the Second World War. It was formed on 9 September 1938, initially as a *women's* voluntary *service*, and existed until 1 February 1949, when it was merged into the *Women's* Royal Army Corps.
