Sure and Certain Hope

Dear friends

I write this letter amidst great uncertainty over the current pandemic and all it will mean for us individually, locally, nationally and globally. You won't read this for about a fortnight, so I will not attempt to predict where we will be by then...

Instead, I'd like to share with you how we are approaching this time as a church, and about the sure and certain hope in God which is at the heart of our faith,

I know that this newsletter is necessarily full of cancellations of the many village activities which won't be happening after all. At St Brandon's, as in every other parish church, we are compiling a Parish *Continuity* Plan, and thinking about how we can *continue* to worship God, to grow in our faith, to support one another and to offer pastoral and practical care alongside others in the community. This means we will continue to:

- Follow Church of England advice on the impact of COVID-19 and provide updates on the Church website
- Keep St Brandon's church open during the day for as long as possible. We don't foresee the need to close, so please visit the church as and when you can and take time for personal prayer and reflection.
- Hold a service of Morning Prayer at 8.15am each day Monday- Friday, with a particular focus on praying for those who are self-isolating or ill, so please do let me or others know who is in this situation. If we can't meet in church, we will say Morning Prayer in our homes using the church's daily readings. Do join us via the Daily Prayer app or Church of England website: www.churchofengland.org/prayer-and-worship/join-us-daily-prayer
- Ring the church bells whenever possible!

We don't know about Sunday services but will keep our website updated with latest plans, including of course our services in Holy Week and Easter, beloved of so many in the village. We will miss marking this time all together, and the village Choir singing, but we will continue to worship, whether separately or together, at the published times, to mark these key events in the life of Christ and in our Christian faith.

Without the death and resurrection of Christ which we will remember this month, Christianity and churches would simply not exist. If Jesus had just been born, lived and died, he might have been famous and influential for a few years until the next great teacher or prophet came along. Instead, at his resurrection everything changed, for all time, and his followers were empowered by his Spirit to continue his work and share God's love far and wide. The resurrection proved that the power of evil and death has been broken, and 'opened the gate of heaven to all believers', as we say in our Communion services. This sure

and certain hope in what Christ has done for us means that we trust in God not only for this life but for eternity.

Whatever the situation by Easter Day, let us rejoice that Christ is alive and hold on to God's hope to strengthen, sustain and inspire us:

May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that you may abound in hope by the power of the Holy Spirit. (Romans 15: 13)

Thomas Campion and the Brancepeth Link

The name of Thomas Campion (1567-1620) may strike a chord with but few denizens of Brancepeth Village, but this archetypal renaissance man is linked to the locality through a publication of 1614 viz. *A description of a masque: presented in the Banqueting room at Whitehall, on St Stephen's night [26 December] last at the marriage of the Right Honourable the Earl of Somerset [Robert Carr]: and the Right Noble the Lady Frances Howard. Written by Thomas Campion. Whereunto are annexed diverse choice airs composed for this masque that may be sung with a single voice to the lute or bass-viol.*

James 1 gifted Brancepeth Castle to Robert Carr, one of his 'favourites', thus forging the link. In the above, however, 'written by Thomas Campion' refers to the *description* of the masque, for other composers were involved in its production, including Nicholas Lanier (1588-1666), the first holder of the post of 'Master of the King's Music'.

Sunday, 1 March 2020, was not only the first Sunday of Lent, but it also marked the 400th anniversary of the death of Campion, a poet, composer, writer on poetry, and a medical practitioner. Today he is best remembered for his lute-songs which he sometimes divided into two groups: 'divine and moral songs' and 'the dainty conceits of lovers'. Following liaison with Anna, it was agreed that one of Campion's songs of the former group, 'Never weather-beaten sail', be performed immediately after the eucharist on 1 March. Hester Higton kindly agreed to sing to my accompaniment on the lute, and did so beautifully; it was also agreed that the inspiring text of the song and a brief overview be included in the parish magazine.

Never weather-beaten sail more willing bent to shore,
Never tired pilgrim's limbs affected slumber more;
Than my weary sprite now longs to fly out of my troubled breast.
O come quickly, sweetest Lord, and take my soul to rest.
Ever blooming are the joys of heaven's high paradise,
Cold age deafe not there our ears nor vapour dims our eyes;
Glory there the sun outshines whose beams the blessed only see;
O come quickly, glorious Lord, and raise my sprite to thee.
