

Dear Friends,

'Keep the heart awake to Love and Beauty!' This line of Malcolm Guite's poem cited by Geoff in last month's letter is often on my mind these days. Half of this strange year, so dominated by C-19, is already over, and many of us wish we could turn our minds now to a well-deserved summer holiday. If only! Talking about holidays used to be one of my favourite activities – there was so much excitement in the dreaming and planning! However, we must not forget that holidays are a fairly new concept. In medieval times, people travelled for work, war or religious reasons. Later wealthy people travelled for leisure and education; in Victorian times, the seaside spas became popular. It was only in 1939, that a new law in Britain directed that everyone must have an annual paid holiday, and it was only in the 1960's that foreign holidays became generally affordable and popular. So maybe this is another lesson in not taking all of our blessings for granted?

However, thinking things through rationally (yes, we do know that travelling is a luxury, and yes, it can be very harmful to the environment), does not always satisfy the longing heart. As we read in Proverbs 13: 'Hope deferred makes the heart sick, but a longing fulfilled is a tree of life.' What can we do?

One way, of course, is to reflect on our longings, but grappling with the path of reflection might not sound so tempting right now. I really liked the very good suggestions we had in the 'Brancepeth Bugle', which made me realise how little time we normally allow ourselves for the things we really like doing. But still, there is our 'wanderlust' (a lovely German word).

To satisfy it, and to make this summer special, we could try and elevate our regular activities to a higher level. For example cooking: Around the world with soups — a taste-bud tingling activity! Or walking: Why not start to count your miles, e.g. with a simple step-counter? My husband and I are doing at least 1,000 miles a year (walk1000miles.co.uk) and it is very satisfying to see the miles accruing. And on the way, one can even do some litter-picking! Being outdoors is the thing we humans are made for, and nothing has a better influence on our

mental and physical well-being; however, I can hear some of you saying: It is boring! Not so, if you start looking at your surroundings with a more inquisitive mind, and start finding out more about the things you see on your way. Trees, flowers, dragon flies, traces of history – all tell you a story, and every new thing you discover will fill you with joy and energy!

Another way to satisfy the 'wanderlust' at home is to start something new: learn a new language (very accessible and easy for example with duolingo.com), or a new skill, which takes you to places you have never been to, and widens your horizon—just like a journey would have done. Once you start thinking along these lines, there is no end to the possibilities of a unique journey, which might last a lot longer than your two week holiday timeslot, and might even change your life! Another life-changer can be prayer. Some might already have a routine, which is great, but maybe something different could put new energy into it? Prayer walking? Centring Prayer? Praying with the World Church (uspg.org.uk)? Looking up charities, and praying for their work? Or even getting involved? Or reading a book of the Bible, researching the background, and praying to hear what this book is saying to us today? The engagement with God's word can open up new horizons you never dreamt of, and can give you insights and memories that will never fade away. So why not venture out on a spiritual journey?

Remember: 'Keep the heart awake to Love and Beauty!'

Change. . . and the churches in Durham Diocese

'What will change after the Covid 19 crisis?'

This question is on everyone's mind. In common with all organisations, churches too are having to look again at what they do and how they do it. . .

In some ways, this is nothing new — churches have been changing over the past few decades, like it or not. Many are smaller than they used to be. Among Anglican churches, increasing costs of buildings and just 'keeping going' are taxing the resources of ever older congregations. It's not that people aren't finding faith — or finding a place in a Christian faith community. All around the country, lots of people are discovering live faith and joining churches — but these are usually not Anglican churches!

So asking 'what will change?' is not something that has just popped up with the corona virus lockdown. Churches throughout the Diocese have been asking the question in different ways and in differing degrees of urgency for years. They have wondered how to be more pro-active, rather than just helplessly shrugging at inevitable decline.

Some churches in our Diocese have been taking part in a programme called 'Partnership for Missional Church'. This helps them look seriously at how to encourage and implement *culture* change. Which — as we all know — is pretty challenging to do. 'Culture' is to do with the main 'feel' or the outlook of an organisation. We can think of examples from work or home of how ingrained the 'culture' of an organisation can be. Some families have an 'upbeat' culture. Some organisations have a 'risk averse' culture. Others have a 'complaining' culture. Churches often have an 'anxious' culture, fearful about having enough money to stay open. What people have noticed about culture is that it is not dependent on the individuals who happen to be there. (The loudest complaining teacher retires . . . but the staff room remains as 'complaining' as ever.) Finding effective ways of enabling culture change is challenging. The temptation is to try some kind of practical 'fix': re-structure the business; fire the middle manager; in churches — send the minister on a training course, or have a building project, or

hire a youth worker. The result? 'Technical change' but not transformative culture change.

Technical change has its place, but for culture change, what is needed is 'adaptive' change. The point here is that the whole organisation has to change. Everyone has to 'adapt' and change. And this kind of challenge is uncomfortable. 'Partnership for Missional Church' recognises this and helps churches with a carefully thought out series of events, research projects, training and shared gatherings, spread over a long period. This is all based on the gradual building up of changed habits and practices . . . which leads to culture change. . . . And this leads to churches becoming less fearful, more open; less apologetic, more at ease taking their place in the surrounding community; less separate, more working in partnership with other groups; less looking for God just in church, more noticing God in the neighbourhood.

I have been part of the diocesan Partnership in Missional Church scheme from the start (2014). I'm a member of the Enabling Team, where we are fairly hands on as well as holding an overview. It's challenging and energising, often demanding different ways of thinking! 14 churches have taken part already and another dozen are doing so at the moment. Like everyone else, we're adapting to these lockdown days by transferring everything to Zoom, and reflecting as we do so on how this is changing our relationships both inside and outside the church context.

The question 'What will change?' is interesting. But the question 'How will we adapt and change?' is perhaps more important - for us all?

Peter Aitken (PA) interviewed by Sabine Heslop (SH)

SH: How long have you been living in Brancepeth?

PA: Nineteen years. We had been living in central Durham, which was convenient for its transport connection; but we wanted a quieter life and a bigger garden, so we came to Brancepeth.

SH: What do you like in Brancepeth?

PA: The community spirit is at the top. Allied to that is the Village Hall, which is the best village hall in the whole of County Durham.

SH: Really? How long has it been there?

PA: Since 1924. The then land owner Lord Boyne leased the land to the villagers, who built the hall all by themselves. In the mid '70s, the Brancepeth Community Association (BCA) purchased it and became freeholders. Since then, a lot of refurbishment has been carried out, and we have had a major project almost every year, for example in recent years a new kitchen, new LED lighting, window double glazing, an improved sound system, much better chairs and a new stair lift.

SH: Amazing! May I ask how this is financed?

PA: With difficulty! We have quite a few contributing members and regular hirers, but the most important part is the £3,000 annual grant from the Parish Council. Also, we run fund-raising events for specific planned improvements.

SH: This is impressive! I agree with you that this is an awesome Village Hall indeed - As a temporary member of the Youth Club and the Village Choir, I enjoyed the facilities a lot! Have you been involved with the BCA right from the start when you moved to Brancepeth?

PA: Not straight away, but I soon became the secretary of the Garden Club, and in 2005 also the secretary of the BCA. Since 2019, I am the chairman.

SH: This is very good of you to have such community spirit!

PA: Well, I retired in 2007, and I looked for something useful to do.

SH: I admire that! As a former parish councillor of Satley, I know how difficult it can be to organise events and raise the community spirit. And I believe you also hold an OBE? May I ask what for?

PA: I received it in 2004 for my work with disabled people, which was not part of my professional life. I have been interested in disability issues for over 30 years.

SH: God bless you for all you are doing! One last question: What is your hope for Brancepeth? What could be better?

PA: The biggest issue we have is the fact that Brancepeth is cut in half by the A690. Most people live north and west of it, whereas all the facilities like the Castle, the Village Hall, the Church and the Golf Club are South East. The road poses a major hazard, since many do not observe the speed limit, and whizz through. Only a fixed speed camera can improve this, but the chances of getting it are almost zero, since the Durham Constabulary does not favour them.

SH: Oh dear! So all we can hope for is more responsible behaviour by the drivers. Thank you very much, Peter, and all the best for the future!
