

Greetings,

And so it continues. How lovely if I didn't feel bound to comment on these strange times and the changes in our lives brought about by Covid 19. So many plans and dreams cancelled. So many hugs missed.

I had a birthday early on in Lockdown. Our original plans for celebrating were ditched and David and I celebrated with an M and S fish pie and a bottle of champagne. One of our daughters gave me a subscription to Netflix. Not the usual sort of gift she would come up with but it made me feel very trendy. Now I could now hold a meaningful conversation with grandchildren or with students we know.

The first thing we watched was an American series called Designated Survivor. It had lots of episodes and we thought it would keep us going to the end of lockdown. Little did we know!

Since the 1960s, in the United States, a 'designated survivor' is a named individual in the presidential line of succession, chosen to stay (at a secure and undisclosed location) away from events such as State of the Union addresses and presidential inaugurations. Should disaster happen to the whole cabinet, he would become the next president.

In the drama, Tom Kirkman, played by Kiefer Sutherland, a low level cabinet member, suddenly finds himself in this position. He is unprepared and many think he is unsuitable. He has to quickly adjust to the new normal. Funnily enough, one of the many situations he has to deal with is a pandemic. He sorted that out in just one episode!

Many times over the last few months, I have felt like the dedicated survivor. Thankfully for all of us, no one has expected me to run a country, but I have found myself again and again facing situations that are new to me and ones for which I am not prepared including not doing things and having to stay at home. And I don't suppose I'm the only one.

But when it all threatens to overwhelm me, I try to remind myself that I have so much to be thankful for: I have a home, I have kept well, I don't have to worry about losing my job, I have a garden, I live in the countryside and I live in a rich and peaceful country.

But as the months have rolled I have also noted some new things to be thankful for.

There has been plenty of time to clean out cupboards and to defrost the freezer. A couple of outstanding painting jobs have got done. The breadmaker has come out of the back of the cupboard. Some new recipes have been tried.

I have watched the seasons change as David and I have been out running, and I feel that this year I have had a front row seat to nature and its transformations.

We have discovered many new paths and tracks that were unknown to us before: even some not far from our house.

Even though we were unable to see them in real life, we have enjoyed WhatsApp, Facetime, Zoom and phone conversations with family and friends.

We have missed being inside church but we have had beautiful and thoughtful Zoom services, with lovely music and some great chats in the Zoom rooms afterwards. How lucky we are to have such talented people in our congregation who ensure that happens.

As designated survivors, I believe God only gives us what we need when we need it and that I need to keep my focus on him and be thankful. And whatever you do, whether in word or deed, do it all in the name of the Lord Jesus giving thanks to God the Father through him.

Colossians 3:17

Whatever your circumstances I hope and pray that you will find moments to be thankful.

After the turbulence of the Easter term at Cranmer Hall, with all my summer placement plans in disarray and with the prospect of many months in my student house accommodation up on the Bailey in Durham city stretching ahead of me, Anna sowed the seeds of coming to St.Brandon's for a 2 week placement.

Thank you for the welcome, the encouragement, the affirmation and the sense of community that has enabled me to feel so comfortable. So much so, that I hope St Brandon's will be a place I can continue to connect with over the coming year.

SH: How long have you been living in Brancepeth?

DJ: Wheat, Barley, Oilseed Rape, Beans and Grass.

DJ: Not great. There was sun, when we needed rain; and then there was rain, when we needed sunshine.

SH: I see. Do you also have livestock?

DJ: Yes, I have a few sheep. It was a good lambing and they all thrived in the Spring sunshine.

SH: How did it go for your holiday cottages?

DJ: Not bad. Due to the lockdown, they were closed initially, but then, we could take in essential workers. From 4th July onwards it just went crazy, and they were soon fully booked.

SH: I guess there is a big demand for domestic holiday accommodation these days?

DJ: Indeed. We are actually looking at converting more buildings to cottages now.

SH: Good luck with that! What are your hopes for Brancepeth?

DJ: That it all keeps going. I really care for the community with the church at its centre, and I hope it will continue to flourish!
