

Dear friends,

Happy New Year! It's the traditional greeting, of course, though this year it might be more appropriate with a question mark rather than an exclamation mark after it. Happy New Year?

The familiar tradition that goes alongside the greeting is the making of New Year Resolutions. But again, doing that doesn't quite seem to ring true as we embark on 2021. Not to run out of sanitiser? Not to meet up with family or friends? Mmm ...

I'm reminded of the conversation in J.R.Tolkien's *The Fellowship of the Ring*: "I wish it need not have happened in my time," said Frodo. "So do I," said Gandalf, "and so do all who live to see such times. But that is not for them to decide. All we have to decide is what to do with the time that is given us."

That's wise advice, of course, but it's not necessarily easy to know just how to follow it. It might help, however, to think about 2021 first in terms of our fears for it. Obviously the pandemic will be front and centre, particularly in the next few dark months. General fears about its spread, about hospital capacity and the number of deaths, combine with more personal fears for our own health and that of those close to us. Then there's Brexit which, as I write in mid-December, still looks like the 'oven ready' deal might end in 'no deal' with all the terrible implications for supply chains and the economy in general which that implies. Which brings me to climate change, and fears that we just won't do enough soon enough.

Fears are not only depressing but also potentially debilitating, and while there may not be much we can do about such big issues, it doesn't mean we can do nothing. Perhaps resolutions do have a place after all.

And alongside our fears, what about our hopes for 2021? Of course, we all hope for the successful roll-out of the vaccine so that the pandemic is brought under control, and we can get on with our lives. Then we will have particular hopes for ourselves, our family and friends, our communities, our nation, our world.

Putting fears and hopes together takes us (rather obviously – you saw this coming, didn't you?) to the words from the first verse of 'O little town of Bethlehem':

Yet in thy dark streets shineth the everlasting light; the hopes and fears of all the years are met in thee tonight.

Being reminded that God knows and meets us in the middle of our hopes and fears – and not just now, but in 'all the years' – and that His everlasting light will keep shining, might help us to face and work to overcome our fears, and to believe and trust that our hopes will be fulfilled.

So not quite Happy New Year, but at least best wishes for a year in which our hopes and fears are likely to face greater challenges than usual.

Carol Beeby (Sacriston at St Brandon's) - (CB) interview with Grace Hart - (GH)

GH: Hello Carol! I understand you have recently retired from nursing. What got you into nursing?

CB: Hello! I was always interested in science at school, especially biology as I had an excellent teacher. When asked why I wanted to pursue nursing during my interview for nurse training, I can remember answering that I wanted to help people.

GH: How did you find your training?

CB: Really enjoyable, if a little daunting at times! It suddenly all felt quite real. I'd only really considered it on a big picture scale before and hadn't thought about the detailed practicalities of what it might involve (not being able to have time off when everyone else was off!). Despite a few shock moments, I found a way through and eventually trained as a general nurse and midwife, before going into community midwifery.

GH: Wow, it does sound like a challenging yet fulfilling vocation. Was that your experience?

CB: I certainly found fulfilment in it, yes. Both community midwifery and practice nursing enabled me to treat the whole person and not just the condition. Working as a community midwife gave me the opportunity to get to know the families of my patients and understand more of their lives.

GH: What a privilege. Speaking of whole life, can you tell me a little about your journey of faith?

CB: Growing up, I attended a C of E school and Sunday School, but wouldn't say that I had a personal faith until coming to St. Brandons about 13 years ago. A friend invited me to a 'Back to church Sunday' service, and the rest is history! I quickly became more involved in various roles including being PCC secretary.

GH: How does your faith impact your everyday life?

CB: I think it has given me the opportunity to reflect upon the world and its injustices. For me attending church provides a forum highlighting Christian values and provides the opportunity to 'give' to those less fortunate than us. St. Brandon's supports the Foodbank, the women's refuge, the Children's Society and DASH (Durham Action on Single Housing).

GH: Interesting. Of course some of those injustices are felt more now than ever. What are some of the joys and challenges you've experienced during lockdown?

CB: Thankfully there have been many joys! I've had the opportunity to do more gardening and walks with our dogs, as well as spending more time with my husband at home (although it took a bit of getting used to at the start of lockdown). Also the square in which we live has done more community activities, from communal plant and food deliveries to three-legged races on VE Day when social distancing was required! One lady who lived on her own was so determined to take part in the race that she strapped on a third 'leg'!

GH: Haha, that's fantastic! She certainly showed perseverance in the face of a challenge.

What have been some of the challenges you've faced in this period?

CB: I guess like many people it's involved a lot of cancelled plans. In my case, I was looking forward to making the most of the extra time retirement afforded me by visiting people I hadn't seen in a while. It has also been a real shame not to be able to be in the church building.

GH: Indeed. One final question: as you enter this new chapter of retirement and as restrictions hopefully ease, what are you most looking forward to?

CB: It will be wonderful to be back in our church building again and to be doing more of the activities that have been put on hold, like visiting family and friends and having people to stay. I have also started to try to learn to play the piano, which I hope to continue.

GH: Brilliant! I'm a piano player myself and strongly believe that it's never too late to learn! Thank you for all that you've shared, Carol. Happy playing!

The Messy Church Team and Barbara welcomed a lovely crowd of young and old for a very atmospheric Christingle service on 3rd Advent. Stage improvements in the Village Hall – carried out during Covid restrictions

First John Morgan's art work was mounted on the back wall, then a star cloth was ordered and hung at the back.

Next some of the unused kit was removed from high level.

The curtain track, known as a tab rail was ordered and assembled, thanks go to Ian Stoker for helping with this; then the track was hung, including a new timber support beam, thanks go to Ian, James Dalton and Dave Armstrong for assistance.

The new curtains were measured up and material was obtained from South Shields.

Curtains were then made and hung on the rail.

Side panels known as legs and high level panels known as skirts were then made and hung.

These mask the sides and the high levels of the stage from the audience.

All curtains, legs and skirts have lead weights sewn into the hems to help them hang.

The legs can be rotated through 90 degrees to suit the stage use.

Thanks go to Christine Jones for all the sewing.

Thanks also to Martyn Jones for masterminding the improvements.

Update from Brancepeth Community Association (BCA)



You may recall that at this time of year, the BCA asks its members to renew their annual subscriptions for the year ahead. The subscriptions are a significant part of the BCA's income and help with the upkeep and maintenance of our beloved Village Hall as well as helping to facilitate hall users with social, recreational and

educational activities at subsidised rates.

The ongoing pandemic with social distancing rules has impacted upon groups and individuals accessing the village hall for a significant part of last year and we will therefore extend 2020 membership subscriptions to the end of March 2021 – covering a period of 15 months. Thereafter, in the spring, we hope that you will renew your annual membership from April 2021, at the same membership subscription fees that have been held in place for 12 years.

Although the village hall closed in late March 2020 (and reopened periodically during the summer and autumn, complying with government guidance) the BCA has found ways to add value to your membership fees during these challenging times. At the start of lockdown, we set-up a Springwatch page on the BCA website and welcomed lots of wonderful photographs of flora and fauna in and around the village, attracting overseas interest with extended family and friends of villagers. We hosted several online themed quizzes with help from some expert quiz masters. The 'take-out meals' - using the village hall as a collection hub - were very popular. Although we could not host the planned VE Day celebration event in the hall, we were still able to celebrate outdoors and some fantastic video footage and photos were captured and posted on the BCA website. The Scarecrow Competition was great fun and was part of a broader set of activities put on for young people during the summer holidays under the guise of 'BrancepethAlive', funded by the BCA, our local County Durham AAP and in partnership with St Brandon's and Brancepeth Parish Council. The compilation Xmas Show DVD and Advent Windows were a great success. Thank you to all involved.

Whilst the hall was closed we took the opportunity to progress works on the upstairs 'Stage' revamp (enabled with a grant from Durham County Council) with a new modernised overhead storage area, a new star cloth backdrop and stage curtains. The upstairs has also been fully repainted. Also repairs to the chimney stacks and some electrical works have been completed as well as the installation of a phone booster for increased phone signal in and around the building. The existing stairlift was 20 years old and prone to breakdown so in April we replaced it.

To make the hall as safe as possible, we have also undertaken a detailed Covid-19 risk assessment, implemented new safety measures and purchased a large stock of cleaning products, hand sanitisers and paper towels. There are detailed Covid-19 guidance posters situated throughout the building.

Lastly, to let you know, the BCA committee will change at the next AGM (to be held in April 2021) with a few of our long serving committee members retiring from the committee. If anyone would like to be involved in the committee, please contact me – your input would be very welcome. Wishing everyone a safe and happy new year ahead.

In 1997 the Spice Girls found a gap in their calendar and performed for a very appreciative Brancepeth audience. At least I think it was the Spice Girls...certainly looked and sounded like the real deal to me. And ABBA...they turned up in 1999. I suppose Mama Mia the musical was still a few years away, so they had the time. Did you know that over the years Brancepeth audiences have clapped and sang along to grand performances by the Beachboys, Laurel and Hardy and the cast of Grease too? Yes, ok, of course those entertaining acts were really talented members of our community.

Back in 1998 Frank Coffield treated everyone present to a rousing rendition of Rule Britannia...dressed by Queen Victoria with hair styled by Bet Lynch (look her up!). Oh, also in 1998 Miss World aka the wonderful Margaret Dobson turned up to show off her fabulous figure in her swimsuit. What a very special lady and a great sport.

It was lovely to see some of the old comedy sketches: the Talent Show sketch of 2003 featuring Kath Curry, Martin Peacock in a swimming sketch in 2016 (yes, really), Rick and Rachel's "The Future" from 2017, and of course, that comedy classic "The Buffet" by Josie Armstrong, when she accurately described how a Brancepeth buffet works. Some of you will know that Josie is still working off her community service after alleging the bishop's wife has an on-line gambling addiction and the Queen owed her Avon money!

A huge well done to the children of the village for their brilliantly performed play in 2019, coached by Martin Peacock. It's worth mentioning that the play was written by the children themselves. Yes, I know, quite an achievement...the next generation of Brancepeth talent is in safe hands.

The DVD ended with a 2012 rendition of "We wish you a Merry Christmas" from the children of the village (most of them children no longer) with accompanying visual effects.

Post DVD some of us "zoomed" (how many of us had even heard of zoom this time last year?) into the chat rooms to raise a glass and say hello to fellow Brancepeth residents, past and present.

Parish Council update

The Parish Council continue to meet via Zoom to progress village maintenance and improvements. At the last meeting items that were discussed included;

The Field. The Parish Council are pleased to hear that a group of residents have formed a 'Friends' committee. They have set out their objectives elsewhere in this newsletter and we look forward to hearing what they will propose for the use of the field when Covid restrictions are lifted. The Parish Council hold a lease for the tenure of the field, this being the strategy to maintain an input and stake in any proposals for it in the future. This lease runs to 2023 and we are currently checking our status as tenants to underpin our position. The Parish Council run a contract to get the grass cut on the field, also some selected verge areas in the village not covered by DCC. We are seeking to renew the contract for Spring to ensure we have continuity when the current contract expires.

The Parish Council are working on updating their website to improve its visual appeal, improve its accessibility for everyone and give some interaction to the information from ourselves with residents. We are hoping to launch the new site early in the New Year.

A new noticeboard is to be installed soon on the verge near the entrance to the field. With the boards already at the Village Hall and in the bus stops we want to improve access to information and discourage fastening notices in an unsightly way to trees and telegraph poles. Again, we're hoping to have this installed early in the New Year.

Our next Parish Council meeting is at 7:30pm on Monday 11th January. This will be a virtual meeting using Zoom. Residents are welcome to attend and if so, please get the dial in details from the clerk via our website.
