Face to face

The past 18 months have demonstrated that there is no substitute for meeting face to face: time with family and friends has become even more precious after enforced separations. Only when we meet someone in person do we get to know them as they really are, since the virtual world can so easily mislead, hide or disappoint. Research into online church during the pandemic has shown that it is far from satisfying, though St Brandon's has certainly made the best of it!

I wonder, however, whether we sometimes have *virtual* relationships with God? We can view God at a distance, our perceptions formed through ideas and experiences that may distorted as a result. If as children we were always being told off, we will probably expect God to do the same; if being silent and 'well behaved' in church were the expectation, then we may find it hard to express ourselves in prayer and worship.

How crucial then, to discover the reality of God for ourselves. The Christian faith promises us that, through belief in Jesus, we can know God in this life and one day meet him face to face. As St. Paul put it in a very famous chapter about Love:

For now we see through a glass, darkly; but then face to face: now I know in part; but then I shall know even as also I am known.

(1 Corinthians 13 v.12)

These famous words also bring hope and strength in the darkness of loss, that our loved ones are safe in God's care. As it says on the graves of all the 'unknown' and unnamed British soldiers in the war cemeteries of northern France, each one is 'known unto God'.

This month is the season of Remembrance. Our annual All Souls Day service is on Tuesday 2nd November at 7.00pm (NB not 7.30pm as in last month's dates list) and Remembrance Sunday is on 14th. We also have two opportunities for live music in church, at a time when such creativity and joy feels particularly needed and precious. On Sunday 7th, the Chapel Choir of St John's College Durham will sing Evensong at 4pm, and on Sunday 14th, there will be a concert directed by Bishop David Stancliffe at 7.00pm. Full details of all these are later in this newsletter and you are most welcome.

I look forward to seeing you face to face in the coming weeks!

A Rocha UK

A Rocha UK (www.arocha.org.uk) is a charity currently supported by St Brandon's as part of its commitment to environmental issues, and a volunteer representative – Gerard Corsane – spoke at the special Climate Action weekend of 2nd /3rd October.

A Rocha started in 1983 when two families with a passion for faith and the environment, established a single Christian field centre in Portugal. Since then, the organisation has grown into an international charity supporting multiple projects in over 20 countries around the world.

These all have issues of environment and faith at their heart but vary depending on the local need. They include restoring salmon streams in Canada, creating a nature reserve and alternative income streams in a threatened forest in Kenya and working to enable elephants and human communities to live alongside one another in India.

In the UK, A Rocha has transformed a neglected rubbish dump in Southall into a vibrant urban nature reserve and manages a rural wetland habitat on the Suffolk/Essex border (Foxearth-Meadows).



In addition, they produce resources for churches and partner with organisations up and down the country who are trying to transform their own conservation work. A Rocha UK also work with Christians, churches, and Christian landowners all over the UK to better care for creation together, through various different schemes. St Brandon's is currently a holder of its Eco Church Bronze Award, demonstrating our level of environmental awareness; something we hope to improve on significantly in the future

Climate Change Talk 2.10.21, The Castle Chapel, by Pat Sharples

This is my personal view of global warming and the climate crisis, where significant changes in recent years to the earth's weather patterns have had serious consequences, threatening our planet and way of life.

So, what are the <u>causes</u> of climate change – it's a build-up of gases in the atmosphere such as carbon dioxide, methane, and nitrous oxide (even the names of the gases sound scary). These gases form a blanket around the earth, trapping heat from the sun, and causing the planet to heat up – the 'greenhouse effect'.

Although the greenhouse effect is necessary to keep the earth's temperature stable, I was shocked to learn that human activity has accelerated the levels of gases in the atmosphere by 40% during the 20th and 21st centuries, leading to increasing global temperatures. The Met Office reports that the 20 warmest years on record globally, have occurred in the past 22 years.

As for the <u>sources</u> of greenhouse gases, they come from burning fossil fuels such as coal, oil, and gas for electricity and heat, and account for a quarter of human-made greenhouse gas emissions. Another quarter comes from agriculture, deforestation, and livestock – the removal of forests to grow crops instead, has allowed carbon dioxide to build up. Trees remove CO2 from the atmosphere, providing 'carbon sinks', so fewer forests=more CO2. Raising livestock for meat and milk instead of using land for crops, increases methane levels. Other sources of greenhouse gases come from cement production and aeroplane emissions.

How does the greenhouse effect <u>change</u> the climate system – land, air and oceans become warmer, ice and glaciers melt, sea levels rise, ocean acidification occurs, there are changes to ocean currents, we experience more extreme weather, and changes to rainfall patterns.

What are the <u>impacts</u> of climate change – localised flooding, and flooding to coastal regions occurs, marine ecosystems are damaged, fisheries fail and coral reefs are compromised, biodiversity is lost, seasonality changes, humans, animals and wildlife suffer heat stress, habitable regions of pests expand, there is an increased risk of fires and forest mortality, infrastructure is damaged, food insecurity occurs, there is a risk to water supplies globally, and we see conflict and climate migrants.

How do we <u>reduce</u> global warming and stabilise weather patterns – it's obvious that we need to cut greenhouse emissions, change to renewable energy sources, use land more sustainably, and possibly develop techniques to remove carbon dioxide from the air.

How do we <u>achieve</u> this – by persuading governments, businesses, and organisations around the world to reduce emissions, and work with the scientific community to deliver research into climate change. Fingers crossed, COP26 will have a positive outcome.

Lastly, we should take personal responsibility as individuals. I've made a conscious effort to live more sustainably to reduce my carbon footprint, and to guide me, I think of words beginning with the letters RE – I reuse and recycle things, I repair and reimagine stuff because I don't want my children and grandchildren to resent me and my generation for (w)recking the planet, and if we all did our bit, remarkable things could be the result.

From a Brancepeth Kitchen: from Shepherd's Pie to Aloo Gobi

Monday, 17th March, 2020, marked the country's descent into covid lockdown and, for the Allatts, self-isolation. For us, however, the date holds a glowing significance: a 5 o'clock phone call, a query about our plans for supper, then the delivery of a succulent shepherd's pie. The event heralded a flow of culinary masterpieces from the Aitken kitchen

Over the past 18 months we have been privileged to dine on mouth-watering dishes from European and Indian cuisine. The more familiar included fish pie, creamy pastas, and rich casseroles: lamb and apricot; pork and prunes; venison and cranberries; pheasant; pork and orange and walnut. There were also visual delights on which to feast: bacon wrapped, stuffed chicken set in gleaming jewels of cherry tomatoes, sombre figs, and lean French beans.

Alongside this munificence, and challenging our English tastebuds, came an introduction to the traditional dishes of Southern India. They ranged across first and main courses, sides, and sweets to include prawn curry; chicken pepper fry, red lentil dahl, and pepper chicken; aloo gobi (a delicious treatment of sliced potatoes), spiced butternut squash, vegetable pilav, aubergine tamarind, and antelp beans; and smooth mango fool.

Indian cookery is one of Peter's interests, honed by his friendship with Beena Timms. Beena, who is from Kerala in Southern India, has collected traditional recipes from friends and family, handed down the generations, and never previously recorded. With Peter as her pupil and assistant, the recipes were tested and collated to produce the cookery book* from which the above dishes were drawn.

Over the past year and a half, we have enjoyed the expertise and adventurous cooking of the Aitken kitchen. We cannot thank Peter and Evelyn enough for their time and effort which has contributed so much to our wellbeing. They are soon to leave the village. We trust this was not the only means they found to release them from what might have seemed to be growing into a lifetime commitment. However, when we came to the village, almost 50 years ago, ranged across the mantelpiece was a display of local contacts: Hair – Browns; Aga and Boiler – Moody..... Perhaps Evelyn and Peter might consider a similar display, including, of course, the newly established culinary tradition of The Copse.

St Brandon's Church Climate Change Collage

In keeping with St Brandon's tradition of making collaborative art, a collage, using donated fabric and clothing, was created during Climate Change Weekend. Time for reflective prayer in the castle chapel set the scene. We contributed woven, sewn and glued pieces to symbolise our love of the natural world and the way in which humankind has taken it for granted.

Amongst the images can be seen: all created beings; misused resources; nature's glory; marred beauty; stick-sweetened water; fire and flood, the consequences of global warming; a brilliant sun; and, ultimately, reasons for hope. Colour and texture played their full part.


