Dear Friends,

I am writing this with another sweltering day in prospect – in the high 20s°C here in the north, and high 30s°C in the south. This is one part of the 'levelling up' agenda we don't want! Probably, however, by the time you read this, it will be raining and cold – but that shouldn't lead us to think that things are getting back to normal. As with Covid, there are the beginnings of a 'new normal' emerging, with high temperatures, wildfires, drought declarations and hosepipe bans the order of the day.

For most of us, these are probably relatively minor inconveniences, though for some the high temperatures mean serious health risks, and for farmers there is the prospect of crop failure. For many in other parts of the world, climate change already means regular crop failures, famine, or the prospect of having to move (environmental refugees are already a reality and the number is only going to grow).

We know all this, but I wonder to what extent I, and we, are prepared to radically alter our lifestyles to try to prevent the rise in global average surface temperatures exceeding 1.5°C – the critical level above which there is likely to be runaway climate change. We will be thinking about all of this again in a series of three Sundays in September and early October.

One of the things we will be able to report on by then is the outcome of our involvement in a Church of England 'decarbonisation of churches' project which was carried out in collaboration with Durham Energy Institute at Durham University. As well as St Brandon's, St Nicolas Church in the Market Place, St John's Neville's Cross, and the Cathedral were all involved, so we will be able to compare our situation with theirs, and begin to look at what action we might take.

Important as that is, the carbon emissions associated with St Brandon's are only about the same as a typical household – so in combination 'our' carbon emissions as a congregation (and village) are many times higher than the church's. All of us have probably already taken some action to 'decarbonise', but in some cases (particularly heating systems and cars) we need to be sure that any 'investment' we make doesn't cost more carbon in its manufacture than it will save in its use.

So, as we focus on climate change in our worship, we will also need to pray for wisdom in how to play our part – as Church and as individuals – in providing a planet that is habitable for our children and grandchildren.

'Shining light on medieval manuscripts'

Modern science meets medieval art

A presentation by Professor Andrew Beeby durham university

A commonly asked question is 'what materials were used to create medieval manuscripts' ? Although a number of materials were known to be used as pigments – coloured materials used to make the paints employed in the books - relatively few books had been analysed using scientific methods to unequivocally identify the materials used. Historically pigments were identified on the basis of their colour or appearance, a method that is demonstrably unreliable.

At Durham University a team of scientist and historians, Team Pigment, began a collaborative project to scientifically examine the pigments used in medieval manuscripts, dating from the earliest Insular Gospels through to the start of printed books in the 16th century. We have developed mobile instrumentation that allows us to visit libraries across the country and analyse the pigments in a book in a non-invasive and non-damaging way. These rely upon spectroscopy – literally shining light onto the page and looking at the light which is reflected back.

Remember Boyan? Wish to help one Ukrainian?

This is a message from Geoff and Carolyn Knott who used to live at 2 Rectory Cottage. For many years, Carolyn used to organise the Boyan Ensemble's visit to Brancepeth, which was part of their annual national tour.

The last time Boyan were able to tour the UK was 2015. No doubt many of you have thought about them from time to time. Remember also the wonderful times they gave hosts in the village hall after the

concert!

Since 24 February 2022 Ukraine, and also the choir members who gave such heart-stirring performances, first in the castle and later in the church, won't have been far from your minds. Carolyn and I have been in daily contact with two choir members since the day of the invasion. Leonid Koberskiy and Stanislav Kolotov share an apartment in Kyiv. We support them morally but also financially as they now have no income.

What we are about to ask is - if you feel you would like to provide short term help for one person in Ukraine, Leonid's mother, then we can help you, together with others, to do that.

Leonid's mother, Lyudmila, lives in western Ukraine. She is widowed and receives a small pension but until this year, Leonid and his sister Larisa have helped her pay for her gas heating during the winter months. Leonid is unemployed now and Larisa's very successful mushroom farming business has been destroyed by the war. They cannot help her this year.

Our plan would be to provide the opportunity for a group of people to donate whatever they wish/can afford monthly, for 6 months from October 2022 to March 2023. We realise that you only have the

memory of Boyan to connect you with Leonid's mother's temporary need, but we assure you that by making a small monthly commitment, for a limited period, there will be huge relief for Lyudmila and of course Leonid and the rest of the family. Existing money transfers to Leonid and Stanislav are secure and we receive instant confirmation of their receipt, with no deductions from the amount sent. You can be assured therefore that Lyudmila would receive every penny of your donation. The war continues to devastate lives and livelihoods.

Some readers of Geoff's article may be wondering what has been happening in the Diocese since the original appeal for help from Ukraine. The following extract from the Diocesan newsletter may provide answers to some of your questions and provide links to organisations helping in other ways.

Message on behalf of the Revd Joanne Thorns, North East Churches Acting Together and Val Barron, Communities Together Durham acting on behalf of the Diocese of Durham

There is still a huge need for people willing to host those fleeing from the conflict in Ukraine and our efforts to support those affected are ongoing. We have committed to helping to bring refugees to the UK by taking part in Communities for Ukraine. This is a refugee sponsorship programme in partnership with Citizens UK and linked to the Government's Homes for Ukraine Scheme. By being part of this we can better match refugees with host sponsors and the process supports Ukrainians in their application process. There are a large number of people who have applied and are now seeking a host family. If you are interested, complete the form. We share the details on your form with Citizens UK who help with the matching process. This involves each party looking at each other's details then speaking online in advance of decision making (with a third-party present for safeguarding purposes). If the match is agreed the host, then applies through the Homes for Ukraine portal (if they haven't already applied). You can find information about the Citizens' scheme and how it is working with partners to provide safe, relational matching between refugees and hosts, along with ongoing support, in Citizens UK's Communities for Ukraine scheme. If after reading the information you are interested in becoming a host, please register your interest by completing the form. Please note: Completing this form does not provide a guarantee that you will be matched and does not commit you to accepting a guest or guests. Local Authority partners will assess the suitability of any accommodation being offered. For more information contact: regionalofficer@necat.co.uk or val.barron@communitiestogetherdurham.org.uk

Clare Staines 15th January 1951 - 17th July 2022

Davida Clare Shannon (she always hated her first name which was a family offering from her father's side of the family) was born in Edinburgh, the third child of Moira and Bill Shannon. Such are the vagaries of existence that she would not have been born at all were it not for the death of her elder brother from a birth condition which has now been mercifully consigned to the history books. Until leaving for university she lived within a stone's throw of the Firth of Forth where she spent a happy if rebellious childhood. Such was her love of the place that she willed for her ashes to be scattered in the Forth.

At 18 she went up to university in Newcastle to study physiotherapy which she practised until her retirement at the age of 58. There she met Edward, a medical student -

eventually. He had always fancied this tall blonde girl walking the corridors of the Royal Victoria Infirmary but she just never seemed to notice him. At that time she was very short sighted but too proud to wear glasses so she really had not seen him. It took some matchmaking by some mutual friends to get them together and they married in Edinburgh on 23rd September 1978 after a short engagement. They had already bought their marital hometo-be in Brancepeth at number 5 Foxes Row and three years later moved to number 1.

Clare enjoyed village life but her first priority was always her family with Helen born in 1980, Chris in 1982 and Fiona in 1987. She was never at the forefront of village activities but could always be relied upon if provisions were required for an <image>

event. Her one and only contribution as an actor was a memorable performance as the Pink Panther in one of the village shows. Her love of family was extended further with the birth of six grandchildren on whom she doted. She was never happier than when the whole extended family descended on Hull's Close.

Clare will always be remembered for her sporting prowess. She was a lifelong tennis player and passed on that love to her children. Their ability soon surpassed their father's and he was relegated to being ballboy in family tennis matches. The tennis mantle has now been taken up by Sarah, Helen's elder child. She was a competent skier. On retirement she took up rowing and joined Durham Amateur Rowing Club. This was a cause of some surprise to Edward as she had always professed a dislike of the cold and was not keen on getting wet. But she persisted and formed some firm friendships at the club.

Sadly, Clare was diagnosed with pancreatic cancer in early June 2022 and the condition was terminal at diagnosis. She bore the diagnosis and palliative treatment with acceptance and stoicism. Even at this stage she was clear with instructions. She was to die at home, she was never to be put in nettie knickers and her life was to be celebrated with a party where Bollinger champagne had to be served. Edward is proud to report that all three conditions were met.

Bill Currie 1940 – 2022

Bill lived a life of kindness and care, friendly and polite to all – a true gentleman who was held with fond regard in Brancepeth village where he lived with his wife Kath for 20 years. He lived a humble and gentle life of service and exploration. Being absorbed in nature was where he was most content and his love of walking took him on many expeditions. From early childhood in Leeds the family would set forth youth hostelling, walking and climbing. Roped together and using ice axes they ascended Snowdon in January and the Matterhorn Switzerland when Bill was 14. Whilst studying for his first degree in Agriculture, Leeds, he would hop on his motorbike and sidecar and adventure with other student friends in the Cairngorms (his favourite place in the world) and the lake district. After Leeds university, Bill attended Dick Veterinary collage in Edinburgh where the mountains were even closer. Graduating at 27 he found work helping with the Foot & mouth outbreak in Shropshire before moving to Cockermouth to work in veterinary practice and meeting Kath who he married in 1971. Bill loved the Cumbrian farmers and their animals especially cattle. What a contrast to move from his beloved mountains to Halesworth, Suffolk in 1979. Scratches and bites from pets increased and bruises and kicks from farm animals decreased as the work shifted more towards the surgery, being a more agricultural area. Bills adventuring continued with 35 years of caravan holidaying with Kath and later after Kath s breast cancer, holidays to many countries. Moving to Brancepeth to be closer to his daughters (Beth) family brought Bill joy sharing his love of nature with his grandchildren, helping the family on their small holding and going on short and long distant walks together. He loved the community spirit of Brancepeth and contributed by cleaning the church, scything the grave yard, baking for the coffee morning lending out his many books. The church community in Brancepeth was his spiritual home. His faith was deep, gentle and humble with the Christian values of kindness and generosity emanating from his heart. He Continues to live in service today with his body being used for teaching medical students at Leeds university. Kath and Beth are extremely grateful for all the cards, flowers, support and providing a wonderful buffet in the village hall. £350 was raised at the service held on the 18th August for St. Cuthbert hospice where Bill spent the last leg of his journey. A big THANK YOU to each of you.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS – September 2022

Cricket Field

We are delighted to announce that we are finally moving towards completion of the five-year lease for the cricket field. We are hoping to have a copy ready for signature shortly.

We have been able to enjoy continued access to the field even though the original lease expired in March 2018. The new lease, backdated to the original renewal date, regularises that position and means that we have had uninterrupted access to the field since 2008.

We now need to decide what course of action we should take regarding the future of the field after the new lease expires in March 2023. There are a number of options we can explore but we need to know your views before we make any decisions. With that in mind, we will be sending a short questionnaire to every resident in the Parish this Autumn. This is your chance to tell us what you think. Your views are very important to us so we would be grateful if as many residents as possible complete and return their questionnaires to us. We would also welcome the views of young people in your household.

Once your views have been collected and collated, we will hold an open meeting in the Village Hall to share the results and put forward a proposed plan of action.

"Thomas Wright was born in rather humble circumstances in the small town of Byers Green in County Durham. Expelled from full time education because of an apparent speech impediment, he rose to prominence by virtue of a lively imagination and a lot of hard work. He enjoyed the support and admiration of the highest in the land - even the King and the Prince of Wales were patrons. Wright was a genuine polymath. An inspirational landscaper gardener, an antiguarian, a skilled engraver, a map maker and mathematician. These days, he's best remembered for his pioneering work in Cosmology - he was the first to realise that the Milky Way is actually the arms of an enormous spiral galaxy and we're embedded within it. More so, many of the little fuzzy patches of light in the sky, then only just visible in the telescopes of the day, are actually galaxies like our own. 
Greetings and an Update from Robert and Sally Scott-Biggs
