Dear friends,

What a weekend!

The *Building St Brandon's* events, marking 25 years since the fire, began with 'Sharing the Story' on Saturday evening. The presentation, masterminded by Tom Hobbs, was stunning and moving in equal measure, taking us from the beauty of the 'old' church, through footage of the fire itself and the resulting devastation, and on to the rebuilding and re-entry. Adrian Dorber, the priest-in-charge at the time, Geoff Moore, and Rick Simpson then shared their memories and reflections of the rebuilding and subsequent developments including the Paradise Window and the Circle of Remembrance.

Early on Sunday morning, a small group gathered for a Dawn Vigil, which included walking round the outside of the building, stopping at various points to reflect and pray, before moving inside to continue to worship in the beauty of that sacred space.

Then the 10.15 service, with the Bishop of Durham Paul Butler presiding and Adrian Dorber preaching. It was good to welcome back many from the time of the fire as well as to remember those who were there 25 years ago but, as Adrian put it, joined us now as heavenly worshippers.

Add to all of that the wonderful historic displays, the flowers, the food and drink, and the opportunities – too many and too quickly past – to meet old friends and share old memories, and it was truly a weekend to remember!

But, of course, it was about more than looking back. On Saturday evening Anna launched the *Friends of St Brandon's* scheme, making it easy for those who have moved on from Brancepeth, or can no longer be regular worshippers, to continue to engage with and support the Church.

And 'building St Brandon's' is a theme for those of us who remain, holding in our generation the joy and responsibility of maintaining the beauty of this sacred space that speaks to us and to our many visitors.

And the building, of course, points all of us to the reality of the living God, to the stories of our earthly lives, to the possibilities of forgiveness and renewal, to the hope to which we are called, and to the faithful proclamation in our generation of the steadfast love of the God we have come to know in Jesus.

Various events and services punctuated the weekend. On Saturday evening there was a spectacular audio-visual presentation and reception, with images and videos of the church before, during, and after the fire, and memories of those who were there. On Sunday morning there was a Dawn Vigil where we gathered to pray, just as those who first discovered the fire did. And then the weekend culminated in the Anniversary Service, led by the Lord Bishop of Durham, and with the Very Revd Adrian Dorber preaching – followed, of course, by a 'Soup and Puds' lunch in the village hall.

Many thanks again to the Archives Group, the Flower Guild, and all who helped with the presentation, catering, and logistics for this significant weekend.

A Weekend to Remember by our Motoring Correspondent.

In early July, a little piece of Formula 1 came to Brancepeth.

Many will be familiar with long time villager Robin Wills' passion for restoring cars and he is often seen driving round the village in his favourite, his magnificent 1937 Green Sunbeam Sports Touring Car.

He rebuilt the car from literally a bag (or several) of bits to the beautiful example of the marque it is today. So good is the rebuild that he has won prizes for it. The last one very recently, the Bill Perkins trophy from the Sunbeam Owners club. Bill was the doyen of the works riding mechanics in the days when the race cars were two seaters with a driver and a mechanic. High praise, indeed.

One of the benefits of that success was that he was invited to provide one of the twenty odd cars for the pre-race drivers' parade around the famous old circuit at Silverstone, prior to the 2023 British Grand Prix. It was the hundredth anniversary of a Sunbeam driven by Mr (later Sir) Henry Seagrave winning the French Grand Prix when he became the first British success at such a major event. All the cars taking the drivers round Silverstone were versions of these wonderful vehicles which at one time had challenged Rolls Royce for supremacy.

The driver he chauffeured round the track was young Australian Oscar Piastri who went on to take the chequered flag for fourth place in the actual race. Oscar was intrigued by sound of the Sunbeam's horn – the very same one that denoted the start and finish of the Goodwell Lea clap for carers in the dark days of the pandemic



– and he had Robin sounding it every time they went past his fans. This created an immense roar from the 140,000 people in the stands.

Robin kept Oscar's number and name on both of the front doors and these caused great excitement on the long drive home as people were giving him the thumbs up, sounding their horns and photographing the car as she travelled home in comfort on her trailer. His tyres also have bits of one of the gravel traps embedded in it.

One of the highlights for Robin was that the car that was the race winner 100 years ago was part of the parade. It is known as the 22/23 Grand Prix Car and the three litre engine was running as well as it did the day of its success.

To top it off, Jean Graham and Anna, Robin's wife, arranged an impromptu party on the green with the neighbours to celebrate Robin's great day.

So, if you see Robin about in his big green Sunbeam with writing on the doors don't forget to give him and his VIP car a big wave. You never know, he may sound that horn for you!
