Newsletter

Happy New Year to all our readers!

As I write, we have just returned for a trip around part of mesoamerica. If, like us, your geography is limited, that's South Mexico, Guatemala and Honduras. We saw beautiful flora and fauna, lovely buildings, interesting (and sometimes strange) churches, amazing Mayan ruins and met friendly and welcoming people.

But the word that probably sums up the trip for me is STEPS. I don't count steps but we did a lot. Steps took us everywhere. It seemed that we were always having to negotiate steps. Steps up to the coach, steps up to the churches, steps up to the hotels, steps up to the markets, steps (big ones) up to the pavements and steps up the Mayan temples (91 big steps in one case).

Of course, steps are useful: they take us to where we want to be, they take us out of the ordinary or the dirty and dangerous. Hotel steps are good-they take you to shelter and comfort, coach steps are helpful as they assist you on your journey, pavement steps keep you out of the traffic and general street rubbish, temple steps can give you a wonderful view of the surrounding area.

As you read this you will be getting ready to step into a new year. Your steps will take you into 2024. I wonder if you are looking forward to it. The start of a new year can make us ponder on what that new year will bring; what it has in store for us. Does it fill us with excitement or dread? But of course, not all steps are the same. Not all will be shiny and clean and take you to warmth and comfort. Some like the Mayan temples will be long rough and difficult to see down until you are right at the edge. The ones you hadn't quite anticipated.

A good time, perhaps, to remind yourself that you don't have to take these steps on your own. I find comfort in the words of Psalm 116 verse 7

"Be at rest once more, O my soul for the Lord has been good to you."

But also, it may be a good time to consider what needs to be hoped for in the year ahead. I often find myself praying for more kindness, not just from myself but from world leaders and those in authority. Kindness seems to have got a bit lost in our modern world. Surely more of it would bring about a better world?

Lady Macbeth accused her husband of lacking the necessary ruthlessness he needed to kill his enemies.

"Yet do I fear thy nature, it is too full of the milk of human kindness".

How about kindness as part of a political statement? There's a thought!

So, I pray that you will be blessed with that spirit of kindness as you step into 2024.

St Brandon's Church Flower Guild

Following a proposal to the PCC after the devastating Church fire in September 1998, St Brandon's Church Flower Guild was launched on 20th January 1999 with 15 members. The aims of the Guild were, and remain, as follows:

- To provide floral decoration for the appreciation of the Parish and to support worship
- To complement and enhance the architecture and heritage of the Church according to occasion and season
- To foster fellowship and bring new people into the life of the Church
- To help and encourage members to gain confidence and develop skills through practical guidance and working as a team
- To be supportive of each other as a group and to provide social contact through common interest

It should be emphasised that even though the Guild is willing to give support and help as required, it has always been envisaged that parishioners would continue to sign up to do Church flowers for any Sunday of their choice.

For festivals and special Church occasions the ideas for floral decorations are worked out and planned beforehand. Guild members are encouraged to help on these special occasions but extra help is always appreciated. Newcomers, especially beginners, will always be welcome to join the Guild and Mary Hutton runs a Floral Art class on alternative Tuesday evenings in the Village Hall for anyone who is interested.

The cost of staging festivals and special occasions in the Church is very expensive and the Guild does rely on parishioners continuing to make donations for the purchase of flowers as they have done in the past.

Everyone in the Parish is thrilled to be back in our beloved Church and we hope you will support the Guild with a small donation to their funds on at least one occasion during the year so that we can enhance our beautiful Church with glorious flowers.

Lynne Hastie has been organising the weekly flower rota since Pam Cook handed over in 2004 and if anyone would like to do a pedestal of flowers please contact her (3781871). It is not necessary to be resident in the village.
