

Dear Friends

Brancepeth in Bloom results, the Garden Cub's Autumn Show photos and results all remind us that the season of autumn is in full swing. Not so welcome if your thoughts immediately take you to shortening days and impending winter gloom. But does it have to be like that?

Much as I appreciate warm weather – and those of you who know how challenging heating the castle can be, might have sympathy with that – I find a richness in the seasons. There is rarely a monotony in our weather measured objectively, but can be if we measure it subjectively with a small window of 'desirable' weather that 'makes us happy'. Our weather is what gives our countryside the width and variety of flora, and the first-class agricultural produce, when it's sufficiently balanced. So, it's a good thing we can't choose our weather by popular demand. Sadly, our insatiable desire for 'things that make us happy' can result in us influencing our weather patterns.

I like to see autumn as a time for harvesting 'internally' in parallel with 'externally'. For thinking about the good things that have happened earlier in the year that perhaps feel fruitful, warm blessings in my life. Things I am grateful for, that have fed me and been fulfilling. Finding the sun still warm on the rarer days.

Autumn invites me to embrace change: bracing myself for the discomfort of reducing temperatures and increasing layers of clothing, yes, but also the need for letting go. Autumn is the dying back to make space for new growth, be it on existing root or freshly planted in the spring. In step with that, I consider what lies ahead, what I need and what can rest. What will I be glad to pick up with in spring, and what might I want to do differently?

The church season of Creation runs to 4th October, St Francis' Day, and encourages us to reflect on our life values and climate influences. These are things that start with each of us internally, our being prepared to change from inside to out.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Parish council membership

One again, may we remind you that there is still a vacancy on the PC. If you are interested in contributing to your community, please do not hesitate to contact our Clerk or have a chat with any of the current councillors or, indeed, pop down to the next PC meeting. Have a look at some of the fascinating things we discussed at our last meeting below.

County councillor

We were pleased to welcome Cathy Hunt, one of our two Durham County councillors, to the September PC meeting. Cathy provided useful input on several of the issues raised.

Anti-social behaviour

Along with speeding vehicles (see below), this was one of two issues raised by concerned residents. This refers specifically to off-road motorbikes using the old railway tracks and Wolsingham Road. As well a noise nuisance, these bikes represent a safety risk and, sadly, may also be being used in the transportation of drugs between villages. Following the PC Clerk's representations, the police and County Council are now more aware of the situation around Brancepeth and will hold a multi-agency task force meeting later this month to discuss strategies. They are erecting warning notices regarding the potential confiscation of bikes and are planning to use drones. Meanwhile, to help the authorities to more comprehensively map trouble 'hot spots', residents are urged to continue to report any such activity via the DCC online reporting system and the police phone number 101.

Road traffic

Concerns remain over the speed of traffic entering the village from Willington where the A690 passes Stockley Grove, as well as over some cars spotted driving too fast on Wolsingham Road. The police assure us that only a very small percentage of vehicles travelling through the village exceed the speed limit. Nevertheless, this is not the perception held by many parishioners; so, with the support of Cathy, we have asked the County Council to carry out a speed survey around the Stockley Lane junction. We shall keep you posted.

State of the village

The Beautiful Brancepeth working group presented a report. This included updates on plans for village tidy ups and planting, along with problem areas like the A690 verges and overhanging bushes. The PC approved some funding towards the replacement of flowers in the big planters by the village signs and noted the desire of Garden Club members and other volunteers to embark on more bulb planting along the main road. However, before this latter action can take place, Cathy will

arrange a site visit from the DCC Clean and Green team to establish what we are allowed to do, both in terms of volunteer safety and whatever work the council themselves may have planned. Cathy also indicated that funds may be available via herself and her fellow county councillor Emma for the replacement of the white gates on the south of the village.

Planning

The proposed large-scale housing development at Red Barns is likely to be considered by the DCC this year. Although not quite within our parish boundaries, this planned new development would lie directly adjacent to the North East of the parish alongside the A690. With the support of Cathy, the PC will be making representations regarding the negative impact this would have for our parishioners for access to local amenities, and traffic flows, as well as the loss of agricultural land. However, this would have more resonance if individual comments on the scheme were also voiced by you via the DCC website. This is how the link for the planning application summary appears (rather lengthily!) on the Council's planning site:

Hybrid application comprising full planning permission for the construction of 140 dwellings, primary site access and associated SuDS and landscaping; and outline planning permission with all matters reserved for the construction of up to 260 dwellings, secondary access, local centre incorporating retail (up to 4,000 sqft) (Use Class E) and mini-mobility hub, and associated SuDS and landscaping.
